1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Sheth T.J. Education Society was founded in 1949. The founders of this institution are entrepreneurs and philanthropists who are driven with a mission to serve the society and have made significant contribution in the field of education.

Sheth N.K.T.T. College of Commerce was established in August, 1990. Sheth J.T.T. College of Arts was added in the year 1993. The college is permanently affiliated to the University of Mumbai and recognized under Section 2(f) and 12(B) of the UGC Act, 1956, and is also ISO Certified 9001:2015, providing education under seven undergraduate and two post graduate programmes. In addition, the college helps students to pursue education through Yashwantrao Chavan Maharashtra Open University, Nashik. The Learning Resource Centre is automated with SOUL 3.0 software.

The college has been reaccredited with a B+ Grade (Third Cycle CGPA - 2.62) by National Assessment and Accreditation Council.

The college encourages holistic development by providing the learners opportunities to grow professionally, intellectually and academically. The College has got approval for new programs B. Sc (Data Science), M.A. (Psychology), M.Com (E-Commerce), M.Sc (Information Technology) and Research Centre in subject of Commerce from the academic year 2022-2023.

The college has always adapted itself to the changing times focusing on global competency while preserving the ideals that it upholds. The college has a career consultant for providing guidance to the students those who are willing to pursue higher studies abroad and also has a professional counsellor and a doctor on call for the well-being of students.

The institute has also registered with SWAYAM -NPTEL Local Chapter, approximately 300 students have been enrolled.

One of the principal objectives of the institution is to spread higher education to all sections of the society in general. The institution has acquired linguistic minority status to address the needs of Gujarati speaking community in the nearby area. However, the college admits students from notified reserved categories and extends the benefit of freeships and scholarships provided by government and non-government agencies. This helps the disadvantaged students to pursue their higher education without any financial constraints.

Vision

Our Vision statement emphasises that the institution is committed to develop and nurture all aspects of the students including their mind, body and spirit and for attaining/achieving this; the institution makes convincing/dedicated/continuous efforts to give the learners a wholesome/beneficial learning experience. These are carried out through the mentor system. The mentors, through regular discussions persuade students to grow

professionally, intellectually and academically. Values such as 'Sharing and Caring' are built in through group activities and discussions. Learners are persuaded to volunteer and participate in social activities conducted by NSS and WDC. Commitment of college is also reflected through a well planned and structured teaching plan which ensures proper time management.

The departments/committees of our college have always consciously planned programmes/activities so that the mind, body and spirit of the students can be nurtured. The responsibility of moulding the mind and spirit of the learners through yoga/meditation and self-defence is shouldered by NSS, WDC and Health Services Committees. Development of physique of learners is adequately undertaken by the physical/sporting activities conducted by the Gymkhana committee.

The Entrepreneurship Cell and Career Guidance and Placement Cell (CGPC) strive to inspire and motivate learners to grow professionally. Career fairs, placement drives and Informative sessions on entrepreneurship and start-ups. Institutional Weakness

• Availability of space:

Space is a very big issue in a metro city like Thane and Mumbai. Therefore, colleges find it difficult to provide playgrounds and open spaces for sports activities. However, the college hires government playgrounds in the vicinity for conducting sports events.

• High number of students per class:

Number of students in the class is high. Approximately eighty to one hundred and forty. It is a challenging task to give personal attention to each and every student.

• Limited Linkages with Industries for Consultancy Services:

The college has to make more efforts in developing linkages with industries for consultancy. Presently there are very few consultancy projects being undertaken by faculty members.

• Limited scope in syllabus for involvement of Undergraduate Students in Research:

As per the need of curriculum, students are involved in projects and assignments wherever applicable. In addition to this some students participate in Avishkar- a research convention.

Institutional Opportunity

There are various opportunities which can be capitalized by the college. The opportunities are as follows:

Institutional Challenge

Sheth NKTT College has various opportunities and at the same time it faces various challenges. The challenges faced by the college are:

- Getting a No Objection Certificate (NOC) for vacant posts. The college has to function with teachers appointed on contractual basis, which impacts the quality of teaching as there is no consistency in the teaching staff. It also impacts the motivation of teachers as they do not have stability.
- Delay in sanctioning teaching and admin posts, leading to increase in hiring cost of manpower for academic, administrative and technical work which is high when no grants are received.
- High number of students in each class makes personalized attention and teaching a challenge.
- To Increase faculty involvement in consultancy services.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

- The college is affiliated to the University of Mumbai, so the curricular aspects are governed by the University. All programmes offered in the institution from UG to PG are updated as per the guidelines prescribed by the University of Mumbai.
- The college offers program such as B.A., B.Com., B.M.S., BA (Mass Media and Communication), B.Com (Accounting & Finance)., B.Com (Banking & Insurance)., B.Sc (Information Technology) at undergraduate level and M.Com. (Advance Accountancy), M.Com. (Business Management) at post graduate level. From the academic year 2022-23, B.Sc.(Data Science), M.Com. (e-Commerce), M.A (Psychology) and M.Sc. (Information Technology) have been added. The college follows the curriculum designed by the Board of Studies (BoS) of the University. The Principal is member of Academic Council of Chetna College (Autonomous), Mumbai. Four faculties are members in the sub committee of Board of Studies of the University and other autonomous colleges. Teachers are involved in question papers setting, assessment and moderation work for evaluation at University level.
- The academic calendar and teaching plans are prepared in advance for teaching learning sessions. For curriculum enrichment and holistic development of students', institution offers certificate courses, value-added courses and short-term courses.
- All cross-cutting issues such as human values, professional ethics, gender sensitization and environment sustainability have been integrated in the curriculum.

• Feedback is taken from all stakeholders on curriculum and analyzed to enhance learning effectiveness. Suggestions from the feedback are communicated to the University for consideration.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

- The teaching learning process revolves around the need, interest and capabilities of students. It is a student-centric process employing experiential, participative, problem solving and constructivist techniques. Experiential and participatory teaching-learning methods constitute an integral component of the curriculum and of the continuous evaluation. These include: projects, field visits, case studies, presentations, assignments and industrial visits.
- The examination committee ensures the smooth functioning of the examination process as per the guidelines of the University of Mumbai. The college follows and communicates all guidelines issued by the University for grievance redressal during the conduct of internal or external examinations.
- Being an affiliated college, POs and COs are followed as per guidelines given by parent University and these are communicated to students through website and discussed in the beginning of academic session. The programmes offered by college cater to multiple interests of the student community and also at building the human capital needed by the society and nation. The course outcomes primarily aim at imparting knowledge and skills which is critical for building students' competence and personality. There is also an emphasis on holistic development of the students as the learning outcomes focus on imparting values and ethics and enhancing their interpersonal and communication skills.

Research, Innovations and Extension

- The institution has created an ecosystem for innovation and has taken initiatives for creation and transfer of knowledge by conducting workshops/ conferences/training programs.
- Workshops, development programs are conducted by Research Development Cell (RDC) to encourage research among faculty members and students. Guest lectures and quizes are organized on issues related to IPR.
- National conferences are organised. The college has also received funding from ICSSR-WRC for organising a national conference in 2021-2022.
- The college strives to sensitize students about various issues prevalent in society. To achieve this objective the college organizes activities that engage students through an experimental learning process and motivates them to become responsible citizen leading to their holistic development. Students have received various awards/recognition for extension activities.
- Number of extension and outreach programs are conducted by the college through NSS, WDC, DLLE and Entrepreneurship cell in collaboration with Industries and NGOs.
- MoUs are signed for conducting collaborative activities, providing internship, and placement to the students. Field visits are also arranged.
- To encourage research, college has conducted various programs such as faculty and student development programs, webinars/workshops/ seminars/ research paper presentation and quiz competition.
- Faculties have published research papers in journals notified on the UGC website and have published chapters in books with ISBN. Five books are published by faculty with international and national publishers. Three teachers have received grants from University of Mumbai for completion of research projects during last five years.
- The entrepreneurship cell has initiated process of setting up an Incubation center 'KEICE' (Knowledge

Enrichment and Incubation Center) and has applied for the funding from MSME for startup and innovation.

• Research Centre in the subject of commerce has been established from academic year 2022-23.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

- The college provides optimum infrastructure and learning resources. The management and principal meet frequently and discuss the requirements which are needed in a rapidly changing academic scenario. These are prioritized and the facilities are upgraded in a phased manner.
- The institution has 39 airy and spacious classrooms out of which 33 are ICT enabled. Computers have been upgraded, new high speed computers and LCD have been installed in view of the requirement of the curriculum.
- Digital language laboratory has been set up to fulfil the communication need of vernacular medium students.
- In view of securing the assets and ensuring the safety of the students and staff, the entire premises is under digital surveilance. CCTV system has been installed in the campus, corridors, classroom, office, library, examination office, gymkhana, conference room, AV room and computer laboratory.
- Two solar panels have been installed as an alternative source of energy.
- The institution has installed generator as a precautionary measure to handle sudden power failure
- Water coolers with purifiers have been installed on each floor for the use of staff and students. Water dispensers have been placed in staff room.
- A full-time electrician is appointed by the management and a carpenter is called whenever required to look after the electrical, furniture and fixtures of the college under annual maintenance contract.
- AMC for the upkeep and maintenance of computers, projectors, air conditioners and other machinery items is in place. Floor in-charge peons are employed to look after the respective floors.
- Fire extinguishers are installed on every floor. The college has also undertaken power saving measures on premises by using LED tube lights to improve overall efficiency and to save electricity.
- The library is computerized with SOUL 3.0 with application of barcode technology. Students have an access through OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogue). The institution has NLIST- INFLIBNET facility with e-Books and e-Journals.
- The college has a spacious community hall 'NKT Sabhagruh' for conducting cultural activities, annual day and other gatherings.

Student Support and Progression

- Sheth NKTT College strives to support students for their holistic development. Nearly 10 % students avail government scholarships of various kinds besides free ships offered by NKT Trust which is provided to poor and meritorious students.
- All students are insured under 'Yuvaraksha' (group insurance scheme).
- Institution believes in instilling the right values and to create an atmosphere conducive for its students, so that they can flourish in all spheres of life.
- Needy students are provided placement in the college and other sister institutions of the management.
- Students are given due representation on decision making bodies including IQAC to ensure their involvement in college development.
- Fee installment facilities are provided to needy students on request.
- Students are provided skill-based courses in 'NKT Knowledge Center' based within the college

- Institution provides mentoring and guidance to the students in various aspects of co-curricular and extracurricular activities. Various sessions relating to soft skills, language and communication skills, and life skills are organized for students to help them to improve their communication skills. Guidance is provided to students for competitive examinations such as MPSC and UPSC examinations.
- Guidance lectures are arranged to train students to improve their interview skills.
- Placement drives are conducted where students are selected and recruited by various companies.
- Gymkhana committee of the college conducts various competitions at intra-college level. Selected students are sent for National, State and University level competitions.
- Various cultural events are organized by Arts Circle to encourage students to explore their talents and skills. Selected students are sent for Youth Festival at University level.
- College has a registered alumni association with the name 'ANVAY NKTT College Alumni Association'. It plays a vital role in overall development of the students by organizing programs such as guest lectures and motivational sessions for students. Association also conducts various activities for the benefit of the students of the Institution.
- Alumni members are invited as resource person and judges for guest lectures and competitions.

Governance, Leadership and Management

- The college has a vision statement with the core aim of holistic development and empowerment of the youth. The institution focuses on imparting value oriented, skill based and quality education.
- The vision and mission is displayed on the website and in the premises. Vision statement is stated on every notice of the college and also on students' identity card.
- The activities of the college are decentralized through various committees to encourage effective participation
- The college prepares a strategic perspective plan and it is uploaded on the college website.
- The college CDC, IQAC and other committees are formed for the smooth functioning of the day to day activities.
- E-governance is implemented to the maximum extent in administration, finance and accounting, examination, admission and Learning Resource Centre.
- IQAC plays an important role in planning and executing through proper established systems and procedures through continous meetings and action taken report is prepared and maintained by IQAC for improvisation in all aspects of institutional operations and procedures.
- IQAC makes suggestions and recommendations through CDC to start new programs and makes provisions keeping in mind the growing needs of students.
- IQAC ensures the quality assurance strategies by conducting Academic and Administrative Audit. The quality initiative of IQAC is to conduct Gender and Green Audit. Regular meetings of IQAC are held and documented for quality improvement. AQAR is prepared and submitted to NAAC on time.
- The institution has effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff.
- Staff is covered under Medical insurance for which premium is paid by the management.
- Financial support is provided to faculty members to attend seminars, workshops and conferences.
- The institution follows the performance-based Assessment Scheme (PBAS) for the faculty based upon UGC and University norms. In addition, D2 forms are filled by faculty and submitted to the principal through heads of the departments. Performance appraisal for non-teaching staff is based on confidential reports.
- The performance of faculty is also assessed through structured feedback from the students.
- Financial statements are audited on regular basis.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

- College conducts various programs to promote gender equity. Short term course on legal empowerment
 for women, webinar series on women empowerment and self-defense workshops are organised by
 WDC and NSS.
- Every year the college celebrates various national and international commemorative days to inculcate values among staffs and students.
- For environmental consciousness the institution has undertaken various initiatives like installation of solar panel, terrace garden, veritical garden, construction of water tanks etc.

- The institution has conducted green energy and water audit. Efforts are taken to keep the college campus clean and eco-friendly. It has been putting efforts to keep campus environment clean.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

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As Our college vision is Committed and Persuasive efforts towards Holistic Education, the college takes efforts to inculcate the sense of discipline and develop a holistic approach among the learners. Being an affiliated college to University of Mumbai, the college offers multidisciplinary courses under Commerce and Arts faculty such as Foundation Course, Business Law, Environmental Studies, Marketing Management, Psychology, Media Studies, Effective Communication skills, Information Technology etc. The institute have taken proactive steps in supplementing the knowledge and enhancing skills of the students The College also introduced value-based courses and Certificate Courses such as

Basics Tally ERP9, Art and Beauty, Web designing and JAVA etc. In view of the transformations envisioned in NEP 2020, Mumbai University has initiated an ambitious programme to revise and upgrade the commerce and business management syllabi for affiliated college to align them with the changing needs of business and industry. The college will also plan along with the existing programs, courses and available infrastructure to introduce more Multidisciplinary as well as Interdisciplinary Courses. In addition to this, college celebrates National festivals like Independence Day and Republic, observing the Death and Birth Anniversary of our National leaders which help in imbibing the good qualities of the students. To sensitize students about the societal issues, the college has associated with Swami Vivekananda Kendra a NGO to create awareness among students by conducting sessions on the problems in the Society like Gender Sensitivity. 2. Academic bank of credits (ABC): The affiliating University has already introduced Credit Based Choice System and multiple entry system for students at any of the three years degree programme is already in existence in our system. With the multiple exit options, the students will be provided with academic credits earned at each exit option. For earning academic credit points, college encourages students to register for online education such as Swayam/NPTEL. In order to introduce experiential learning, students are made to do projects on various current topics which are credit based. After acquiring autonomous status, institution plans to register with Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) through National Academic Depository, Ministry of Education, Government of India. 3. Skill development: College has yet to venture into introduction of formal vocational courses and formal skill based courses which may lead to Degree in relevant courses. Besides regular curriculum, the college conducts 30 hours certificate courses in Skill Development such as Corporate Communication, Skills Enhancement Course, Investment Analysis and Portfolio Management, Cyber Security etc. The college also offers B.Sc. in Data Science a degree programme, Responding to the changing skills and technology requirements in the market, the institution and plans to integrate with more industries for internship.

4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):

Various programmes and competitions are organised by literary Association of the college to encourage students for Indian languages such as Marathi Bhasha Diwas, Hindi Bhasha Diwas. Art Circle organizes different events based on cultural diversity of India like Annual Day on the theme of "Sangam- Cultural Magic". Cultural and heritage programmes, classroom decoration, patriotic programs on Independence Day and Republic Day. Ancient Indian culture and systems are integrated in curriculum to create awareness among students on Indian knowledge, tradition and culture. Some of the courses are taught in regional language, also the students are permitted to write answers in Marathi in their examination as per the University directives. The teachers assess the answer books of the students written in Marathi without any difficulty. Workshops and Training sessions are conducted on basics and Importance of yoga, stress management, life skills etc.

5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

New Education Policy is more focused on outcome and learning based education. The university frames syllabi of all the courses and mention Programme Outcomes and Course outcomes which are displayed on college website. Pedagogy is designed and used in teaching-learning practices to achieve the learning outcomes. To attain POs and COs, Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) is undertaken which comprises tests, assignment, presentation and practical on the basis of direct and indirect methods. the College conducts tutorials and field visit in smaller groups to make learning more effective. College will be heading towards complete implementation of NEP 2020 within the framework set by the University of Mumbai from time to time.

6. Distance education/online education:

During pandemic, teachers and students were trained with usage of online teaching-learning technology. The college has sufficient IT infrastructure to support online and blended teaching-learning. College also offers distance education through YCMOU, Nasik. During the pandemic, the college successfully conducted regular online classes and examinations through Teach us Application, Zoom, Google meet etc. Moreover, the college had successfully conducted short term/certificate online courses (30 hours) on corporate communications, skill enhancement course, Stock market etc.

Response:

The institution is permanently affiliated to University of Mumbai, as per the guidelines of the University and Board of Studies of all programs, curriculum is implemented. The college has a well-planned delivery of curriculum so that the students are enabled to achieve their learning goals.

- IQAC and Academic Calendar Committee prepare Academic Calendar based on University's Plan and display on college website for all stakeholders.
- Time Table Committee prepares master time table, departmental time table and each department is given time table prepared by time table committee of the institution.
- In the beginning of academic year, departments conduct meetings to decide academic and activities planning.
- Based on the updated syllabus given by the University, teachers prepare teaching plan for each class as per individual time table.
- Teachers maintain daily record of lectures engaged and other activities conducted in annual planner/diary.
- Teachers recommend the necessary study materials such as reference books, periodicals, text books to the students.
- Teachers prepare study materials keeping in mind the intellectual level of the students.

Continuous Internal Evaluation-

All programs of the college are designed and structured by University. Most of the programs / courses do not have CIE system as a part of their curriculum but departments take efforts in conducting workshops, seminars, power point or classroom presentations, quiz competitions, assignment through Google classroom, practical exam to evaluate the students.

- For effective implementation of the curriculum and Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) the classroom teaching is supplemented with class tests, case studies and group discussion.
- Internal assessment wherever applicable, is planned by the Examination Committee and informed to students through examination tab on the college website. Notices are also circulated in the classrooms.
- Teachers conduct Open Book Tests (OBT) and preliminary examination for the students. Random assessment of answer books of OBT is done through model answers and their performance is discussed in the class.
- Students are continuously evaluated by conducting unit tests, tutorials and quizzes offline/online as per the requirement of the syllabi concerned of different courses. Revision lectures are also taken.
- Result analysis of internal tests is done by teacher concerned of the department and the performance of the students is discussed with the students.

- In addition, confidence building program, personality development program, skill development etc. are undertaken through the conduct of certificate courses.
- Experts from industries and academia are invited to guide on specific topic/subject to empower the students for raising their employability.
- During the pandemic, the institution followed guidelines given by the University, teachers used Zoom platform, Google Meet to engage the online lectures using Teach Us Application. Regular attendance of students was taken through Google forms and also recorded in Teach us App.
- For the development of skills and human values among students, co-curricular and extracurricular activities were designed and organised through online and offline mode by various departments and committees to supplement the effective implementation of the curriculum.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum

Response:

Cross-cutting issues related to gender, environment and sustainability, human values and professional ethics are integrated into the curriculum. Some of these courses are compulsory for students.

Professional Ethics- Courses focus on the development of professional ethics in the domain of Management, Information Technology, Banking and Insurance, Accounts and Finance, Marketing Research, Advertising, etc Research related ethics are taught to PG students

Gender Issues- The institution offers programs and courses which include issues like Gender and Society in TYBA program in the subject of Sociology. The courses make students aware of gender related issues as well as laws which provide protection to women. Many programs and activities are conducted to make students aware on the issues like sexual harassment, domestic violence and other women related issues. Coeducation system of the institution promotes a sense of gender equality among the students.

Human Values- Mission of the institution aims instill human values with respect to equality and justice. Human values are central to all courses taught at the institution. Courses provide an equality in approach and humanism to economically disadvantaged groups. Also, principles of professional ethics as implied in the mission of the institution are adhered.

The institution offers compulsory course, viz., Foundation Course for all program at UG level which includes basic human values, socio-economic issues, environment related issues which learnt and acquired by students through project work and PPT.

Environment and Sustainability- Students are made aware about Environment related issues through the course on Environmental Studies which helps students to acquire knowledge of ecological concepts, contemporary ecological challenges and responses to them.

To ensure sustainability, the institution offers courses/papers such as Foundation Course, Economics and Environmental Studies wherein the students are familiarized with issues like urban ecology, global warming, pollution, biodiversity, equity and justice etc. These issues are discussed through the pedagogy.

In addition, Women development Cell, a statutory body also conducts lectures, short term course etc. for girl students. Various academic programmes employ an interdisciplinary lens to understand multiple facets of human experiences, social, economic and political life and explore interconnections between the courses and programmes offered.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

The examination system followed by the college is robust and transparent. The examination committee prepares the schedule in consultation with the principal and conveys to the stakeholders well in advance through college website. Teachers discuss question paper pattern, syllabus for the respective subject and question bank with students in the class.

Internal Assessment:

- The college has adopted internal assessment system for all programs as per University guidelines.
- Since the institution is affiliated to University of Mumbai hence, it follows the mechanism as per University.
- In all self-financing programs, assessment is done by conducting Internal tests.
- Project work is assigned at UG and PG level to the students followed by submission of projects and presentations as a part of internal evaluation as per guidelines.
- In T. Y B. Com internal practical examination is conducted in the subject of Computer Systems and Applications.

External Assessment:

The college conducts semester-wise examinations for B. A, B.Com for 100 marks and B.M.S, B.Com(Banking and Insurance), B.Com (Accountancy and finance), BMM, B.Sc. (Information Technology) and M.Com for 75 marks.

• All question papers are printed in the college examination department under the strict supervision of the examination chairperson and principal.

- Unique seat numbers are allotted to every student for external examination so that the identity of the student is not revealed.
- Computer-generated hall tickets are given to students appearing for college and University examinations.
- Model answers are prepared by teachers to ensure uniformity in assessment.
- Evaluation is done through the Centralized Assessment Process (CAP) followed by moderation as per guidelines.
- External examiners are appointed for viva-voce examination as per University panel norms.
- The college has an upgraded software for preparing results and mark sheets of students. Results are declared on the college website within 45 days from the last day of examination to ensure timely declaration of results.
- To ensure security, garde cards bearing students' photographs are provided.

Grievance Redressal System:

- The College follows and communicates all guidelines issued by the University for grievance redressal to the students at the beginning of the year through college website and prospectus.
- Examination-related grievances are addressed by the examination committee as per the guidelines.
- Additional examination is conducted for students who remain absent in the examination on the account of medical reasons or participating in extracurricular activities.
- Applications received for additional examination are scrutinized by the examination committee. Students fulfilling the norms are permitted to appear for additional examinations.
- After declaration of result, a notice for photocopy and revaluation is displayed on the college website.
- Photocopy of answer books is provided to the applicants.
- In case of revaluation, an external subject expert is appointed and the revaluation process is completed.
- 'Unfair means' cases, if any, are referred to a separate Unfair Means Inquiry committee. Committee follows ordinance 0.5050 of University of Mumbai to take appropriate disciplinary actions.

The institution ensures adequate availability and optimal utilization of physical infrastructure to conduct UG/PG programmes, distance learning programmes under YCMOU and 'NKT Knowledge Centre' for Value -Added Courses.

Physical and Academic Facilities

- Class Room- The Institution has 39 airy and spacious wi-fi enabled classrooms of which 33 classrooms are equipped with LCD projectors, audio-visual aids (collar mike, laptops) and white boards for conducting lectures
- **Laboratories** -The college has 4 computer laboratories containing 111 desktops with updated licensed software for conducting practicals and certificate courses.
- **Library-** The Institution has a spacious library equipped with computer, xerox machine and printers. A range of collection of knowledge resources and information services fulfills an essential requisite in the intellectual pursuit of students and faculty members. Along with these 13 laptops are made available on issue & return basis to teachers for supplementing the teaching learning process
- **Research Center**: Institution has set up a well-equipped Ph.D. research centre in the subject of Commerce from Academic Year 2022-23. Enrollment of 4 students is in process.
- Incubation Cell Institution has initiated the process of setting up Incubation Cell 'KEICE' (Knowledge Enrichment and Incubation Centre for Entrepreneurship) from Academic Year 2022-23.
- The college has principal's cabin attached with conference room, administrative office, two staff rooms with separate departmental cubicles, IQAC cabin, vice-principal's cabin, SFC coordinator's cabin, audio-visual room, seminar hall [NKT Sabhagruha], examination room, NSS office, art circle cabin, WDC cabin, DLLE cabin, commerce association room, counselling room and ladies common room.
- Activity Room Activity room is used for practice of skit, dance, singing, yoga and other performing art activities.
- **Gymkhana-** Institution has a well-equipped gymkhana that conducts indoor events. Gymnasium is available within gymkhana separately for girl students with necessary equipment like treadmills and strength machines for exercise. Students are issued material as and when required. Faculty members motivate students to participate in intra and inter-collegiate sports activities. Central ground near the college is hired for outdoor events.
- **Digital Language Lab-** Digital language laboratory is installed and functional with necessary software and equipment.
- Elevator is provided for the staff. This facility is extended to differently abled students and other students during examination and in emergency
- Entire college campus is under CCTV surveillance with 92 cameras to ensure the security and safety.

- Filtered drinking water facility is made available with water coolers on each floor of the college.
- Two solar panels with the capacity of 20 kw and 60 kw have been installed as an alternative source of energy.
- The institution has installed generator with the capacity of 85 kve as a precautionary measure to handle sudden power failure.
- Fire extinguishers are installed throughout the campus.
- The whole college building is insured against fire.
- As a part of green initiative, the institution has developed pot gardening, terrace garden and vertical garden with the help of students.
- Maintenances of infrastructure is ensured through AMC (Annual Maintenances Contract).

LEARNING RESOURCE CENTER

The role of LRC has been changing according to the evolving paradigm shift in teaching methodologies from time to time. The college library has transcended from its traditional image of only being a collection of books to a Learning Support Center by creating a comfortable learning environment. This has been achieved through managing digital information resources, developing institutional repositories, developing digital library services, offering virtual reference services, promoting open access resources, etc. The college library is in a process of adaptation due to the recent changes in the teaching-learning process. College library is enriched with many textbooks, reference books, journals, magazines, literary books, novels, economic surveys etc.

The library plays a vital role as a reliable and beneficial information provider in the students' academic success and performance. Its basic objective are:

- To improve and expand and the knowledge of students
- To provide encouragement to advanced learners as well as slow learners.
- To develop self-learning as well as group learning
- To provide a platform for effective teaching and learning process with the available resources
- It is an instrument in the institution's teaching learning process to provide continuous access to information and knowledge

During the pandemic, the library has blended an extensive use of social networks and adopted innovative online practices. Following are the different efforts undertaken by the learning resource center for students

Book-Bank Scheme

For the benefit of all students, Book Bank Scheme comprises the following programs -

- STUDENT'S WELFARE BOOK BANK SCHEME (SWBBS) Under this scheme, a set of textbooks are issued to the students belonging to marginalized section of society. Every year the textbooks are purchased from the grant received from the Department of Student Welfare of the University of Mumbai. Under this scheme, remedial lectures are conducted for different classes.
- ADVANCED LEARNERS' BOOK BANK SCHEME (ALBBS) This scheme has been introduced for meritorious students. A set of textbooks is provided to the students, who have achieved success in their previous year's examination.
- SLOW LEARNERS' BOOK BANK SCHEME (SLBBS) Students unsuccessful in previous year's examination, but willing to achieve success in the next examination are eligible to take benefit of this scheme.
- ECONOMICALLY BACKWARD CLASS BOOK BANK SCHEME (EBCBS) Students belonging to Economically Backward Class and wish to achieve success, can avail this scheme.
- UGC-REMEDIAL COACHING CLASS BOOK BANK SCHEME (RCBBS) A set of textbooks are issued to the students belonging to marginalized class under this scheme. Textbooks are purchased from the grant received from UGC.

Earn and Learn Scheme

- This scheme helps financially weak students to earn while they learn. The task assigned in the learn and earn scheme is basically the library work and maintaining the library records. Since 2005, based on the students' response, this scheme has been generating interest among students towards employment and giving them financial empowerment.
- Students enrolled have to dedicate some hours after lectures. These students are able to earn an additional amount for extra hours. No work is assigned during the practical or examination period.
- The nature of work assigned to participant students is to work as per the daily requirement of the library such as to support the counter work, shelving books, article indexing, reprography service, entry in library automation system, technical support for LRC, updating LRC website, etc.
- Students get first-hand experience and knowledge of the tasks mentioned above. It helps the students in gaining experience regarding the library system and also helps the institution in establishing good rapport with students.
- Participants are able to make their career in the field of Library and Information Science.
 Best Readers Award

The Best Readers Award Scheme is an initiative to develop reading habits among the students. Students have to read maximum books as per their choice from the reference section and then have to submit book reviews in the prescribed format. Questionnaires are given to shortlisted students. The Best Readers Selection Committee interviews shortlisted students and then the awardee is selected.

Other Services

• The college also undertakes 'Outreach activity' by providing books to orphans, senior citizens of Thane city. External membership is offered to nearby Government & Corporate office employees. Additional services like newspaper clippings, bibliographic compilation,

reprographic services, scanning and printing, etc. are made available on request.

- Library conductsorientation programme with support of departments, inter-library borrowing and resource sharing through associate colleges in Thane.
- Distance Learning Support to YCMOU students is offered
- LRC also offers 'External Membership' at a minimum fee for the students, who are preparing for competitive examination or completing their education through distance learning.

The Learning resource center is automated with SOUL 3.0. Integrated Library Management Software. The LRC also provides e-book links to the students for reference and educational purposes. All books are bar coded which facilitates easy search. The library staff are highly supportive towards the students. The library staff upgrade their skills and knowledge by attending various conferences, seminars, workshops organized by nearby colleges in Thane and Mumbai.

The LRC displays collections to acquaint and familiarize students with the enriched collection available
with the library. The LRC displays the collection of books on the occasion of the birth and death
anniversaries of eminent personalities like APJ Abdul Kalam, Dr. S. R. Ranganathan, Lokmanya Tilak,
Kranti Jyoti Savitribai Phule, etc. Alumni of the college also contributed in library development by
donating books and software of spoken English. During pandemic period library has provided e - link of
textbooks and reference books to the students.
